# Feedback to the Climate High-Level Champions and the Marrakech Partnership on the 2025 Work Programme

Out for Sustainability (Out4S) appreciates the opportunity to contribute to your reflections on a decade of progress and to the next phase of the Global Climate Action Agenda (GCAA). We commend the Champions and the Marrakech Partnership for elevating non-Party stakeholders (NPS), aligning action to the Global Stocktake, and advancing sectoral collaboration. We also welcome your invitation to provide input on success metrics, inclusive engagement, and improved transparency and follow-up, including enhancements to the Global Climate Action Portal and the Yearbook of Global Climate Action.

## Why LGBTQIA+/SGM inclusion is mission-critical for climate action

A growing evidence base shows that sexual and gender minorities (SGM, including LGBTQIA+ communities) face distinctive and compounding risks across the climate cycle—from exposure and sensitivity to impacts, through preparedness, response, and recovery [1]. Multiple regional and national-level studies document barriers to shelter and services, elevated safety risks, and worse post-disaster conditions; quantitative analyses also find higher probabilities of disaster displacement and more adverse displacement experiences among LGBTQ populations compared with cis-heterosexual peers [2–3]. Climate-justice research further cautions that "gender" framed only as women's issues can inadvertently reproduce exclusion; intersectional approaches are needed so people with diverse SOGIESC—and those with overlapping identities—are not left out of analysis, finance, or decision-making [1,4]. Additional regional and national-level evidence reinforces these patterns across environmental health burdens, humanitarian practice, evacuation processes, and access to relief [9–15].

#### Where NAPs and NDCs stand today—and why implementation must accelerate

Encouragingly, some Parties have begun acknowledging SGM in national planning. A recent global mapping finds references to SGM in 23 of 198 Parties' National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) or related documents, most at an early "sensitive" stage rather than "responsive" or "transformative" [5–6]. The same assessment stresses that recognition "on paper" rarely ensures equitable outcomes in practice, and that exposure—structural drivers that place people at risk—remains underaddressed [7]. On mitigation planning, prior reviews identified only a handful of NDCs referencing SGM—underscoring an early, uneven baseline [6]. By contrast, gender integration more broadly is now common in NDCs, offering an institutional pathway to extend inclusion (safely and context-appropriately) to gender-diverse populations [8].

With that in mind, we offer the following inputs, aligned to your questions and looking toward 2025–2030:

#### 1) What success should look like (and how to measure it)

□ **Equity & representation targets.** By 2030, all Marrakech Partnership thematic areas and priority initiatives adopt and report on minimum inclusion standards (accessibility, non-discrimination, safeguarding), with year-on-year increases in participation from underrepresented groups in governance bodies, panels, and technical working groups.

	Finance for inclusion. Track the share of climate finance and philanthropic co-funding

	each workstream (who can join, how proposals are selected, how feedback is used, and

We red	commend a standing section in the Champions' multi-year plan focused on emerging equity

	Disproportionate climate impacts on LGBTQIA+ people, Indigenous Two-Spirit/Queer
	communities, immigrants, and persons with disabilities—covering heat and health,
	displacement, housing insecurity, and access to services;

	Integrate SRHR and GBV considerations in climate policy and planning; ensure continuity of SRHR services and rights in preparedness, response, and recovery; and reflect SRHR within NDC/NAP updates and financing.
	Commit to safe, voluntary, context-appropriate disaggregation that goes beyond sex
	whenever feasible; adopt privacy safeguards; and use intersectional evidence to design, monitor, and evaluate policies and programmes.
	Protection of environmental and human-rights defenders, including those targeted on SOGIESC grounds, with event and digital-engagement safety protocols;
	Accessibility and assistive-tech integration in adaptation and early-warning systems;
	Inclusive just-transition policies for informal, care, and service-sector workers;
	Ethical, inclusive use of digital technologies and AI in climate action, avoiding bias and exclusion.
Near-	term deliverables we stand ready to support (ahead of COP30)
	<b>Participation &amp; Safeguards Standard</b> and a practical Inclusion Checklist for Champions' partners and sector pathways.
	<b>Community of practice</b> linking LGBTQIA+, disability, and Indigenous networks with Marrakech Partnership leads to co-design templates for inclusive implementation "sprints."
