

## America Is All In Response to High-Level Champions Call to Comment:

## **Proposed Action Agenda Work Programme**

America Is All In — the most expansive coalition of leaders ever assembled in support of climate action in the United States, representing roughly two-thirds of the U.S. population and three-quarters of U.S. GDP — deeply appreciates the High-Level Champions team's efforts to lay the groundwork for increasing global ambition in your proposed Work Programme.

Alongside our partner coalitions in the U.S. — such as the U.S. Climate Alliance, Climate Mayors, We Mean Business Coalition, Ceres, Second Nature, Health Care Without Harm and Environment and Culture Partners, among others — we look forward to engaging further in supporting, shaping, and implementing this plan and strengthening "all of society" action and cooperation around the world that builds on leadership by national governments, state and municipal governments, the private sector, healthcare, colleges and universities, cultural institutions, tribes, and civic groups.

Below are America Is All In's initial priorities and recommendations on the work programme, and we would appreciate the opportunity to discuss and develop these ideas further in later stages of the process. We would recommend:

- Ensuring inclusivity of an array of non-federal actors. We recommend that the Global Climate Action Agenda structure be broadly accessible by non-party stakeholders including those that do not work directly with their national government/Party in an effort to include a diversity of views and experiences. We see value in further prioritizing and facilitating space for many types and levels of actors directly via regional or sectoral groupings.
- 2. Conducting and sharing analysis of what has worked and what hasn't in inclusive, multi-level climate action; incorporating data on non-federal action into COP decisions and UNFCCC reports. With 10 years of work and evidence within the implementation of the Global Climate Action Agenda, the High-Level Champions team would be well-placed to gather and highlight stories and analyses of what approaches have worked especially well in support of further inclusive, multi-level climate action around the world. We are eager to work with you on this. We recommend that progress reports intentionally include data on science-based, non-party action.
- 3. Balancing innovative new priorities and year-to-year support for implementing existing commitments. Recognizing the energy, innovation and global policy influence that incoming COP presidencies bring to the table, we see immense value in support for existing commitments and elements of the Action Agenda to ensure their implementation, as well as new priorities that each Champion brings.
- 4. Use the UNFCCC website to emphasize non-federal action and highlight success stories from the Granary of Solutions. A concerted effort to gather and publicize the success

stories of non-federal and multi-level action, including the Granary of Solutions, can be used to inspire ambition globally.
